Renovating Spaces and Elevating Services

Classroom 314

In December 2023, the library hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the opening of the new third floor classroom. Classroom 314 has quickly become a beloved space by staff, students, and faculty alike, with 81% of the instruction sessions given face-to-face by librarians.

Several design choices make Classroom 314 unique: whiteboard walls, an abundance of natural light, ample space for movement to accommodate interactive sessions, and excellent visibility and accessibility of teaching materials from every student seat in the room.

Any department on campus can request library instruction sessions, which means any space used for instruction needs to be flexible enough to handle such a variety of requests and technologically equipped to enable a broad spectrum teaching styles and materials. This new space is on the cutting edge and enables us to provide richer, more engaging educational experiences for students.

Archives Reading Room

The McDaniel College Archives' mission can broadly be placed into three categories: preserving and providing access to an inclusive record of College history, selecting and maintaining collections of interest to the college community, and supporting the research needs of the college community.

The new Reading Room serves as the public focal point of the McDaniel Archives, serving as both the Archivist's office and the primary space in which researchers can peruse archival materials.

Nearly 30% of research help requests to the Archives are from independent researchers, making the Archives the area in the library with the most robust connections to the world beyond The Hill. Streamlining and modernizing this space creates more opportunity for the Archives to continue its important work of preserving and sharing college history with researchers on- and off-campus. RESEARCH APPOINTMENTS



ARCHIVE CONSULTATIONS In addition to instruction sessions, Hoover Library continues to see significant engagement with reference services, both electronic reference and in-person research appointments. In-person appointments remain the most popular way that students interact with the library for help refining their topics, finding sources, and learning to navigate the world of databases and peer-reviewed research with 144 appointments scheduled this academic year - the highest we've seen since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition to in-person appointments, librarians and reference staff are online 64 hours a week to provide virtual reference services through chat, email, and text via the library website. Because demand for reference services has increased, Head of Public Services Elizabeth Davidson explored options to expand the library's offerings to ensure community research needs were being met.

During the summer of 2023, a solution was found- the library designed and implemented a new chatbot that is in use during the library's 'off hours.' Rather than an AI (Artificial Intelligence) tool, the "Herbie Bot", modeled after the library's unofficial mascot Herbie Hoover, is mapped to handle the most frequent inquiries from our community to prevent any bad information from being provided. It ensures that anyone with quick inquiries receives an immediate response, and those with research questions will be connected to a research librarian. We are excited to introduce the Herbie Bot to the campus community!

ART IN ACTION Connecting the Library to Community

The Student Art Collection includes works of art by Western Maryland College and McDaniel College students. In 2011, Hoover Library launched its ongoing annual program to purchase one piece of artwork from a senior art major to add to the collection. In 2022, the library began displaying older student art pieces already in the archives.

The collection not only beautifies the library, but celebrates the academic and artistic endeavors of the college's students, reflecting diverse artistic disciplines and points of view. It also provides an opportunity to inspire and educate library patrons through the unique cultural experience of a student art collection.

MOVING RESOURCES

Digital and Physical Changes in the Collections

As subscription costs rise every year, it is continuously challenging to balance the requests the library receives for more resources and the budget. While this is not a unique situation to us, libraries and vendors are working together to develop new subscription models.

In FY 2024, we added more than 10 JSTOR databases without significant increases to our subscription price thanks to JSTOR's newly available archive journals and primary sources content. The library actively adjusts our subscriptions according to program changes and usage reports.

Regarding our physical collection, we continued with the reclassification project started in FY 2023, moving more oversized books in the collection to the expanded quarto/ folio collection on the lower level. In addition, to prepare for some of the exciting developments coming in FY 2025, we underwent an extensive weeding project in order to transition the first floor book collection to the second floor.

INTERNSHIPS AND MENTORSHIPS

Promoting Career Readiness at Hoover Library

Lauren processed the General Robert J Gill collection, helping to make it discoverable and accessible to the community. Gill was a class of 1910 alum and had a long and distinguished military career, serving as an officer in WWI and overseeing prisoner of war camps in Europe during WWII. At the close of WWII, he was selected to join Justice Robert H. Jackson's legal team prosecuting Nazi war criminals at Nuremberg. His archival collection contains scrapbooks, papers, photographs, and artifacts from his time at Western Maryland College and his military service. Lauren presented her work in a poster presentation at the Academic Symposium.

Zoe completed a summer/fall internship in the College Archives and continued her work in the Archives as a student worker in the spring. During her internship and spring work, she photographed and cataloged the Winter W. Myers collection, a collection of over 100 antique objects from ancient Egypt, Greco-Roman, Japan, and Native American cultures. Zoe <u>published an article</u> about her internship in Teaching with Primary Source's journal, *Notes from the Field*. She also presented her work at McDaniel College's Academic Symposium.

While some other collections, such as the Gill collection, contain some antique weapons, this collection is the largest collection of weapons in the Archives.
